#### SPECIAL GUESTS



Organist SHILOH ROBY, a native of Staunton, Virginia, holds degrees in Music and Music Theory from Shenandoah University and the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University. In 2007, he departed for the United Kingdom, where he was organ scholar at Truro Cathedral in Cornwall. This was followed by a year of serving in the same position at St. Patrick's Cathedral, the national cathedral of Ireland. Shiloh returned to the United States in 2009 and has been the Associate Director of Music at Christ Church Cathedral, Cincinnati, since December, 2010. While in Cincinnati, he has performed with the Cincinnati Boychoir, Vocal Arts Ensemble, the Lexington Philharmonic, and many other ensembles. In addition to

his work at the cathedral, Shiloh is also an accompanist with the Cincinnati Boychoir, and lead accompanist for the Young Professionals Choral Collective.

YOUNG PROFESSIONALS CHORAL COLLECTIVE is an innovative choral ensemble that combines Cincinnati's love of singing, socializing and culture for young professionals ages 21-45. Now in its sixth season, YPCC is comprised of more than 1,000 singers who create and share high-quality music in an accessible, fun and social way. In it's short history, YPCC has presented sold-out thematic concerts such as *In Vino Veritas* (in which 1215 Wine Bar & Coffee Lab provided a Sommelier and wines from South Africa & Italy while the choir performed choral works from



the same countries), joyful concerts in non-traditional spaces (such as *Chromatic Vision* in partnership with the Contemporary Arts Center at Rhinegeist Brewery), and shared the stage with big names, large organizations and fantastic partners (such as Barry Manilow, the Cincinnati Pops, Foreigner, Cincinnati Shakespeare Company and more). In 2019, YPCC is looking forward to stepping onto the Cincinnati Opera stage in *Blind Injustice*, as well as presenting the world premiere of William Menefield's *PRISM* with Collegium Cincinnati in the Cincinnati Museum Center Union Terminal and on the Carnegie Hall stage in New York City. Each season, YPCC partners with arts and business partners, hosts social activities at local businesses, and collaborates on concerts and activities that support and introduce local arts organizations to our motivated singers and audience members. YPCC is a 501(c)(3) non-profit and is supported by the generosity of individuals, local businesses and foundations, ArtsWave and the Ohio Arts Council. For more information, visit www.ypccsing.org



Dr. MEGAN BOYD currently serves as Associate Director for the Young Professionals Choral Collective of Cincinnati. She has experience teaching choral music at all levels, elementary through university, and has conducted in such venues as Carnegie Hall, The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and La Madeleine Cathedral in Paris, France. As a high school educator, her ensembles consistently earned Superior Ratings at the North Carolina Music Performance Adjudication and an invitation to perform at the 2009 NC Governor's Inauguration. Boyd also led the Michigan State University Women's Chamber Ensemble in their appearance at the 2014 American Choral Directors Association

Central Division Conference. Prior to her position with YPCC, she conducted the Concordia University Ann Arbor Women's Chorale in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and served as an adjudicator for the Michigan State Vocal Music Association. Boyd holds a B.M. in music education and voice performance from Boston University and an M.M. and D.M.A. in choral conducting from MSU.

#### CINCINNATI FUSION ENSEMBLE AND FEATURED ARTISTS

THE CINCINNATI FUSION ENSEMBLE is a professional performing ensemble with a threefold mission: to offer world-class performances, to foster young musicians through high-level music education, and to engage the community. CFE was established in 2013 and is comprised of a roster of over 30 nationally- and internationally-renowned singers based in the Cincinnati, Ohio area. The professional Ensemble, in various groupings, performs in the genres of choral music, art song, vocal chamber music, musical theater, jazz, folk music, oratorio, and chamber opera. Having produced a wide variety of concerts, the Ensemble continues to develop a unique mentorship program to offer applied lessons to highly talented students—regardless of their socio-economic status. These lessons are subsidized through grants and partnerships in the form of need- and talent-based scholarships. Students experience high-level, excellent instruction with teachers of the caliber found in the finest collegiate music schools. Integral to the advancement of its mission, the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble was approved in 2014 for state and federal non-profit status, and is a registered 501(c)(3) organization. The Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble also sponsors an annual summer Choral and Voice Institute (2018 in Savannah, Georgia), an annual Voice scholarship competition, and various community enhancement projects including collaboration with Winton Woods High School.





BRAD CALDWELL, Artistic Director of the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble, enjoys an active and varied career as a pianist encompassing solo, chamber, and art song recitals—having performed in the most prestigious concert halls throughout the U.S., France, Germany, Austria, Ireland, Scotland, South America, the French West Indies, and at many national and international conventions and festivals. Among his numerous awards, he was a finalist in the Walter M. Naumberg Chamber Music Competition, and recipient of the Gold Medal for Collaborative Piano at the Conservatoire de Paris. Holding a BS and MM in Piano Performance from Austin Peay State University, and postgraduate studies in Vocal Accompanying from the

University of Cincinnati's College-Conservatory of Music, Mr. Caldwell was for thirteen years on the Accompanying Faculty at Miami University of Ohio. He is currently Director of Music at Greenhills Community Church, Presbyterian, in Cincinnati.



HOWARD HELVEY, Conductor of the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble, is among the most widely published composers of his generation. Awarded the international choral-composition first prize in 2006 by the John Ness Beck Foundation, and the 2018 Sewanee Church Music Conference Choral Composition Prize, his hundreds of works are published by over twenty major American and British companies, and are regularly performed and recorded throughout the world. Recent highlights include performances of his music by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and Orchestra at Temple Square, the BBC Singers, the Choir of King's College (Cambridge, England), Conspirare (Austin), the Kansas City Chorale, the Phoenix Chorale, The

Crossing (Philadelphia), the National Lutheran Choir, the choirs of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine (NYC), Chicago *a cappella*, the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus, and in the English cathedrals of Durham, Salisbury, Ely, Liverpool, Exeter, Christ Church (Oxford), York, Hereford, Norwich, Chester, Wells, Winchester, and Coventry. Mr. Helvey also concertizes frequently as a pianist, and in 1998 was appointed as organist/choirmaster of Calvary Episcopal Church in Cincinnati. Additionally, in 2016 he became Editor of the historic music publisher, H.W. Gray. With cognate studies in conducting, voice, organ and poetry, he holds undergraduate and graduate degrees in composition and piano performance from the University of Missouri (Columbia) and the University of Cincinnati's College-Conservatory of Music, and, as a Chautauqua Scholar, studied piano at New York's Chautauqua Institution.



Dr. GWEN COLEMAN DETWILER, Associate Conductor of the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble, is an Associate Professor of Voice at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. A champion of solo and ensemble singing, Dr. Detwiler has conducted both intimate ensembles and the masterworks of choral literature, and she has performed as soloist with major orchestras and opera companies in the United States and Europe. Recently, Dr. Detwiler prepared the chorus for Debussy's Noctumes with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Maestro Luis Langrée, prepared the opera chorus for Debussy's Marie Stuarda at CCM and conducted vocal workshops with the Cincinnati Camarata

Choir. Previous to her current appointment at CCM, she prepared numerous choral masterpieces including the Britten War Requiem, Handel Israel in Egypt, Beethoven Symphony No. 9 and Mozart Mass in c minor for Maestro Joel Revzen.

Solo concert work includes appearances with the San Francisco Opera Orchestra, Oregon Symphony Orchestra, Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, San Antonio Symphony Orchestra, Louisville Orchestra, Colorado Symphony Orchestra among others. Dr. Detwiler made her European debut as the soprano soloist for the Klassiche Musikfest Symphonie in Austria. Opera repertoire includes Gilda in *Rigoletto*, Adele in *Die Fledermaus*, Blonde in *Die Entfuhrung aus dem Serail*, the Governess in *Turn of the Screw* among others. In addition to orchestral and operatic performances, Dr. Detwiler's experience with new music and chamber music is extensive. She finds particular joy in these intimate genres, connecting with audiences and fellow artists. Recent performances of note include the world premiere of *Christine's World* composed for her by Juliana Hall and the world premiere of *The Birth Project* composed for her and Audrey Luna by esteemed American composer Libby Larsen. Dr. Detwiler is engaged to perform as soloist with the Summerfest Chamber Music Series in Kansas City in 2017.

Dr. Detwiler received her vocal and opera training at Northwestern University (BA and BM), the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music (MM and DMA) and the San Francisco Opera Center's Merola Young Artist Program. Dr. Detwiler has served on the faculties of SongFest in Los Angeles, the CCM Spoleto Music Festival in Italy, and the Vianden International Music Festival in Luxembourg. She looks forward to joining

the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble in Florida this summer serving as voice faculty for the Miami Choral and Voice Institute. Dr. Detwiler currently lives in the greater Cincinnati area with her husband, Jim, and their two children, Jacob and Katelyn.

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AUDREY B LUNA enjoys a widely varied career singing, teaching voice and teaching The Alexander Technique. Ms. Luna sang dozens of operatic roles in the US and Europe. Audrey's first love has always been collaborating on the concert stage with orchestras, in recital and with chamber musicians. She has had the good fortune to work with such musicians as the Hagen Quartet, Helmut Rilling, Ravinius Trio, Bennewitz Quartet, Baseler String Quartet, Artis Quartet, Percussion Group Cincinnati, Brad Caldwell, Walter Levine, Allen Otte, Awadagin Pratt, Rainer Schmidt, and James Tocco. Concerts at renowned festivals include: Salzburger Festspiel, Luzerne Festival, Schleswig-Holstein Festival, the

Ludwigsburg Schlossfestspiel, Mettlach Chamber Music Festival, Jerusalem Festival, Lexington Bach Festival, the Jerusalem Radio Festival, Shanghai Spring Festival, Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival and in concert halls: Hugo Wolf Saal/Konzerthaus Wien, Berlin Philharmonie, Wigmore Hall, Queens Hall, The Louvre, St. John the Divine, and the Kennedy Center. Another love of Ms. Luna's is contemporary music. She has sung dozens of world premieres, commissioned and collaborated with composers: György Kurtag, Xu Xiao-Song, John Corigliano, Mara Helmuth, Wolfgang Netzer, Thomas Larcher, Mara Helmuth, Allen Otte, and most recently Libby Larsen to name a few. Ms. Luna currently teaches Voice and Alexander Technique at Miami University, The Center for Health and Innovative Learning, and Songfest at Colburn. Audrey believes that supporting the autonomy, conscious perception and awareness in her students, creates a pathway for unimagined possibilities and resources to their individual artistry.



MARY ELIZABETH SOUTHWORTH's repertoire includes opera, oratorio, art song, musical theatre, and symphonic works. She has performed with Cincinnati Opera, Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and Cincinnati Pops under Eric Kunzel, John Morris Russell, and Marvin Hammlisch. She has also been a featured guest musician with *concert:nova* and has also sung with the Dayton Philharmonic, the Dayton Opera, Nevada Opera, Chattanooga Opera, and Kentucky Opera—and sings around the country with Conundrum, a chamber ensemble. Recordings: Storyteller; Unsung Hero, Top Brass; Eau Claire Chamber Orchestra, Live!; That Night and from the Diamond Grid with Conundrum (Albany Records). She teaches

at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music as an Adjunct Instructor of Voice. Mary resides in East Walnut Hills with husband, Jeff Shaffer, twin daughters (her favorite people in the world) and 2 dogs.



Praised for his Italianate voice and sensitive musicianship, tenor DANIEL WEEKS has sung with symphonies of Houston, Dallas, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Columbus, Memphis, San Jose, South Dakota, Louisville, Huntsville, the National Youth Symphony of Venezuela, and the National Orchestras of Mexico and Costa Rica. On the operatic stage, he has performed with the Florentine Opera (Milwaukee), the Cincinnati Opera, the Kentucky Opera, Nevada Opera, Mercury Opera, and San Francisco Opera's Western Opera Theater. In 1999, he was named the National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist, and was a National Finalist in the MONC Auditions. In 2000, the Marilyn Horne Foundation presented him in a New York

Recital. In 2009, he released Women of Firsts: A Recording of Art Songs by Lili Boulanger, Amy Beach, Grażyna Bacewicz, and Vítězslava Kaprálová, with pianist, Naomi Oliphant (Centaur Records). In 2015, he released his CD entitled: The Lieder of Franz Liszt, with Centaur Records. In the fall of 2015, Mr. Weeks joined the faculty of the University of Cincinnati's College-Conservatory of Music.
